#### Rustic Bacon and Cheddar Bread

320g/11 <sup>1</sup> /20z plain flour	200ml/7fl oz milk
1 tbsp baking powder	2 eggs
$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp salt	1 tbsp wholegrain mustard
<sup>1</sup> / <sub>4</sub> tsp freshly ground black pepper	60ml/2fl oz olive oil

100g/3<sup>1</sup>/20z cheddar cheese, grated

 $100g/3^{1}\!/_{2}oz$  bacon lardons, cooked until just crisp in a little sunflower oil and cooled

Preheat oven to 180°C / 350°F / Gas mark 4.

Lightly oil and line a 2lb loaf tin with parchment paper.

Sift all the dry ingredients into a large bowl. Add the grated cheese and the cooled bacon lardons and mix well.

Pour the milk into a large measuring jug, add the eggs, mustard and olive oil and whisk to combine.

Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and slowly pour in the liquid, stirring all the time until it is fully incorporated, to form a fairly liquid dough.

Pour mixture into prepared tin and bake for 50 minutes. Remove from tin and allow to cook for a further 10 minutes on the oven shelf to crisp up the bottom. When cooked, it will sound hollow when tapped on the base. Allow to cool on a wire rack.
