Class 72 Jubilee Top Vase *(for Trophy)*

A vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between 5 and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of 2 different KINDS of plants: 2 varieties of the same plant are NOT 2 kinds. Only fresh HOMEGROWN flowers may be used. Stems used must show flowers only and not berries or seed heads.

The vase can be any shape, size and be in proportion to the display. There are no marks for the vase. No accessories, or additional foliage will be allowed. Only foliage which is attached naturally to the flowers will be allowed. Packaging material – including floral foam – to keep the stems in place is allowed. The vase will be viewed from all directions.

Class 123

Honey, Date and Nut Cake

375g honey	1 cup water
1 tbsp golden syrup	30g butter
250g chopped dates	75g chopped walnuts
30g chopped almonds	350g wholemeal self-raising flour
1 tsp ground ginger	½ tsp mixed spice

Combine honey, water, golden syrup and butter in a saucepan, stir constantly over heat without boiling until butter is melted. Remove from the heat; cool to room temperature. Grease a deep 19cm / 8" square cake tin, line base with paper; grease paper well. Stir dates, walnuts and almonds, then sift dry ingredients into honey mixture; stir until combined. Pour mixture into prepared tin. Bake in moderate (190C/375F/gas 5) oven for about 50 mins. Cover cake with foil, cool in tin.

Class 124

Apricot & Almond Shortcake

310g self-raising flour 1 egg, lightly beaten egg white, lightly beaten
125g butter 1 tbsp lemon juice 30g blanched almonds
125g caster sugar 150g apricot jam

Grease a round 20cm/8" sandwich tin. Sift flour into large bowl, rub in butter. Stir in sugar, then egg and enough lemon juice to mix to a firm dough, cover, refrigerate 30 mins. Divide dough in half, roll out half between 2 sheets of cling film large enough to cover base and sides of tin. Heat jam, strain, spread over base. Roll out remaining dough large enough to cover jam, press edges together firmly. Brush lightly with egg white, decorate with almonds. Bake in moderate (190C/375F/gas 5) oven for about 30 minutes. Stand 10 minutes before turning on to wire rack to cool.

Class 125

Apple Crumble Loaf cake

140g butter, cut into small pieces, plus extra for the tin
250g self-raising flour 2 tsp mixed spice
140g light muscovado Sugar 100g raisins
3 large eggs, beaten 2 apples, peeled, cored and chopped
5 tbsp milk
For the topping: 1 rounded tbsp plain flour
25g butter 25g light muscovado sugar
1 rounded tbsp roughly chopped hazelnuts

Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3. Butter and line the base of a 2 litre loaf tin with baking parchment. Tip the flour and spice into a food processor and add the butter. Whizz to make fine crumbs, then mix in the sugar. Tip into a mixing bowl and stir in the raisins, eggs, apples and milk. Mix well until everything is evenly combined, then spoon into the prepared tin and smooth the top.

To make the topping: rub the flour, butter and sugar through your fingers to make a rough crumble, then stir in the nuts. Sprinkle evenly over the cake mixture and bake for 50-55 mins, until firm to the touch and a fine skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Cool in the tin for 15 mins, then turn out and cool on a wire rack.

3. **Plants in Pots:** Pots shall not exceed 10” (inside diameter) unless otherwise stated.
4. Judges decision is final as regards the merit of the exhibit(s).
5. All produce must be exhibitor’s own growing.
6. No one shall be present in the Marquee during judging, except Judges and Stewards. **Judging will commence at 12 noon on Saturday 6th July.** The Marquee will be open from 10am on Sunday 7th July for viewing.
7. The judges decision shall be final and he/she has the power to vary the number of prizes according to merit. In the event of a tie for a trophy, competitors will each hold it for an equal period.
8. All trophies are perpetual challenge trophies and cannot be won outright. All trophies remain the property of Wrangle Show and holders are held responsible for any loss or damage incurred while in their possession.
All trophies to be returned to the Committee by 20th June 2025.
